About the Design

I love my spikey massaging cushion, but I also love changing things up and wanted a fun cover for my sewing chair cushion. I've designed this FREE super quick cushion cover, so you can make one or two for yourself.

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Before Getting Started

- Read all directions before starting.
- RST means Right Sides Together.
- WOF means Width of Fabric and assumes 42" - 45" wide.
- This project requires pins, don't try to wing it, fabric glue also helps.

Fabric Requirements

- Fabric 0.5 metre or 2 Fat Quarters*

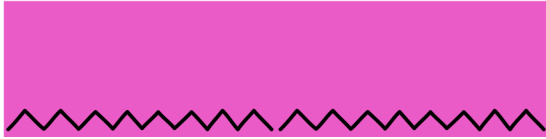
Cutting Instructions

- Cut (1) 18.5" square, it's important to cut this piece first in case you need to decrease the width of strapping.
- Cut (4) 6" x 18.5" strips, or as wide as fabric allows up to 6".

*Note: Cut (4) 5" strips if using fat quarters.

Let's Build The Cover's Backing

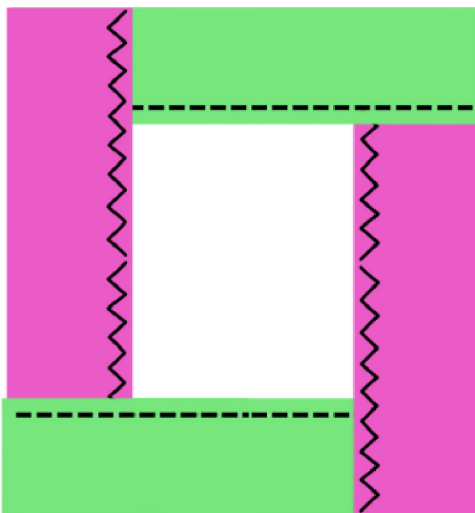
Prepare strapping for the back.



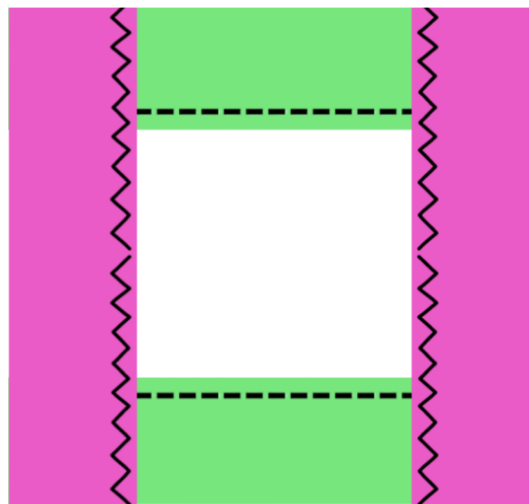
- finish one long side of strapping by zigzagging or top-stitch a narrow .25" hem.

No need to fish edge if you included the selvage.

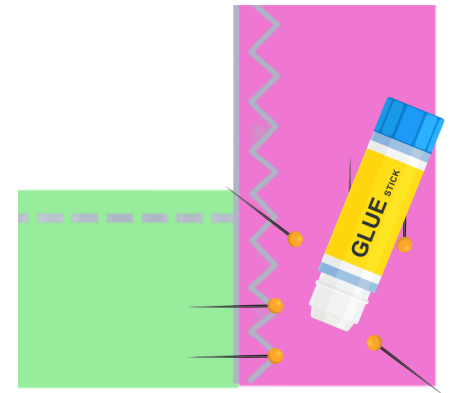
Layer strapping to provide a secure backing.



Method A



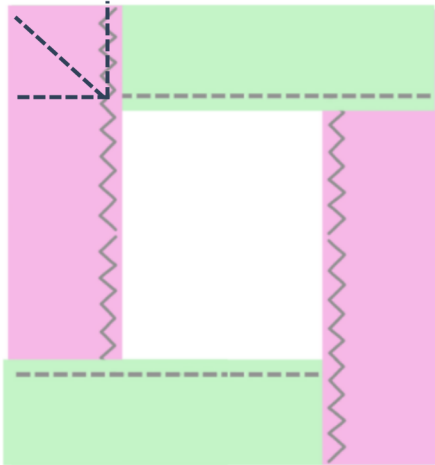
Method B



Pin well. Glue optional.

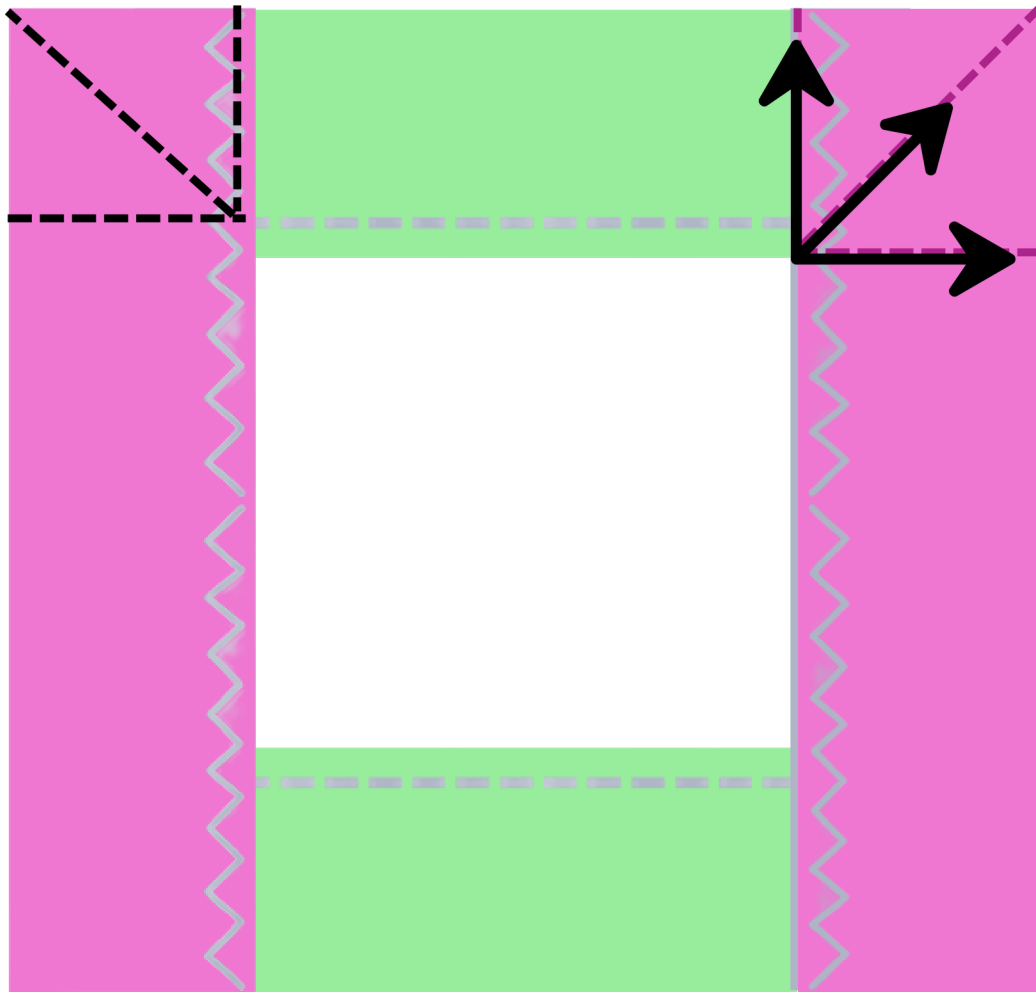
- with rights side up and finished edge facing in towards the center, layer strapping using either Method A or B.
- pin where indicated - don't be stingy, use several pins.
- you may choose to glue the corners down to keep them anchored for the next step.

Let's Build The Cover's Back



Reinforce backing corners.

- top-stitch intersecting corners as desired, either following the initial line of top-stitching, or running a narrow stitch alongside the original.
- add a diagonal line from the center out.
- finish all 4 corners.

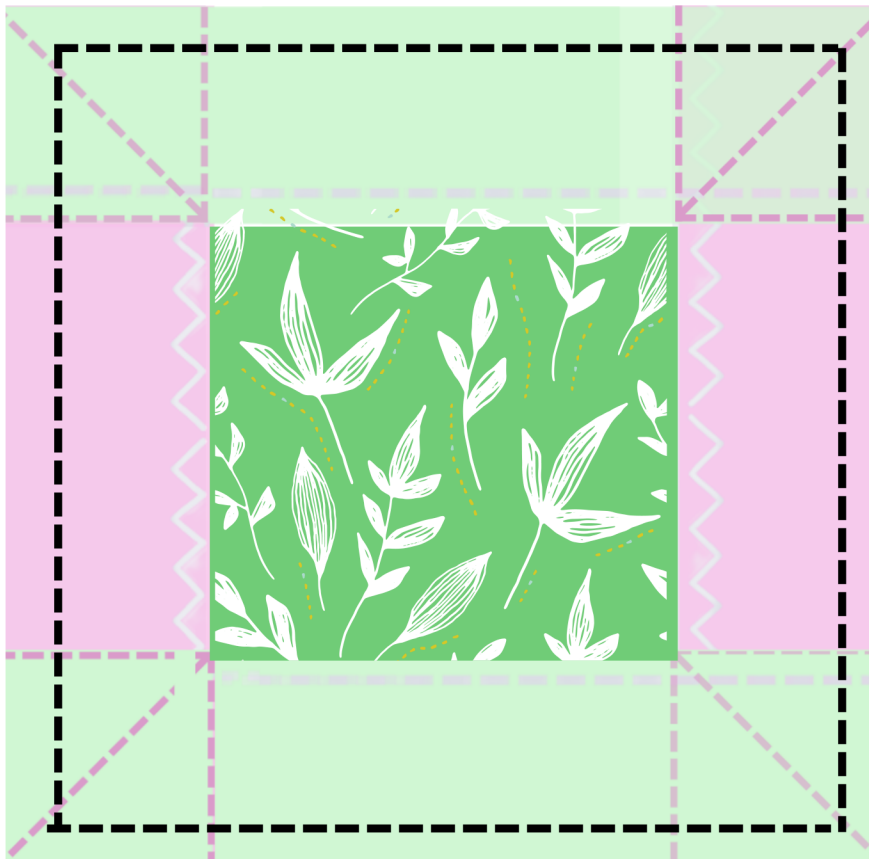

Assemble the Cushion Cover

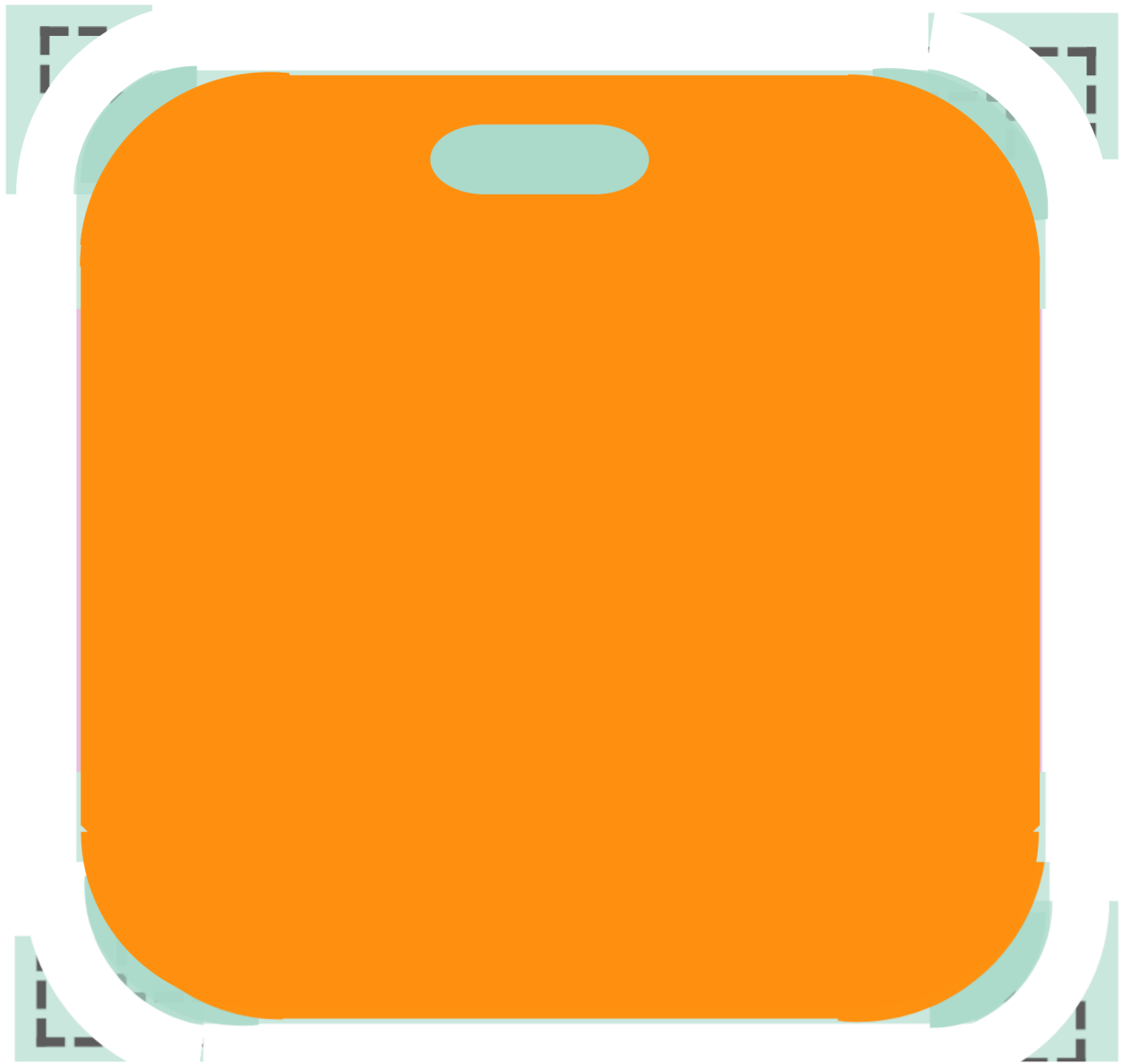


Place the 18.5" square right side up on a flat surface.
Lay prepared backing on top with right sides together.



With the right sides together, stitch the front to back, using a 0.5" seam allowance.

Trim the Corners



Using your seat cushion as a template, add 0.5" for seam allowance. Note if you are making multiple covers, make yourself a paper template with a 0.5" seam allowance.

Sew the Corners



Stitch corners with a 0.5" seam and turn right side out.
